## 36 years ago: Wrigley Field gets "lit up"



It wasn't until August 9, 1988 that the Chicago Cubs played their first-ever televised night game at Wrigley Field. You could say there was an "electric" feeling about the event.

The nationally-broadcast matchup featuring the Cubs versus the New York Mets not only wowed Cubs fans—and disappointed a handful of "day game only" purists—it also marked the abrupt end of 5,687 consecutive home day games at the ballpark known as The Friendly Confines.

Yet it was in <u>July 1988, 36 years ago this month</u>, that the lights first went up in the stadium, allowing a Cubs team consisting of such greats as Andre Dawson, Greg Maddox, Ryne Sandberg, Mark Grace and Rick Sutcliffe to first practice under the bright new beams.

That season, despite a team boasting a half dozen future Baseball Hall of Fame players, the Cubs missed the postseason after posting a 77-85 record and placing 4th in the National League East. But in the end, the word around Wrigleyville is that the lights—and night baseball at Wrigley—won fans over.
